### **Bereavement and Death — General**

Callanan, Maggie and Patricia Kelley. **Final Gifts: Understanding the Special Awareness, Needs and Communications of the Dying.** (New York, NY: Bantam Books, 1992) FRC 155.937 CAL

Concerns the very special relationship of the dying person and the one who is with him/her during this time.

Edelman, Hope. **Motherless Daughters.** (Reading, MA: Addison Wesley, 1994) FRC 155.937

The author combines her own experience of loss of her mother at the age of seventeen with many others she found were eager to share similar experiences.

Fitzgerald, Helen. **The Mourning Handbook: A Complete Guide for the Bereaved,** (Simon and Shuster, 1994) FRC 155.937 Fit

This book is written to respond to the needs of a close family member, friend, or relative who is dying. Also explores complicated issues relating to death, such as when the mourned has been somehow involved with the death, with murder, suicide, or when the death was unexpected.

Kubler-Ross, Elisabeth. **Living with Death and Dying.** (New York, NY: Macmillan, 1981) FRC 155.937 Kub

This book is written to help readers understand the “different languages terminally ill adults and children use when they try to convey inner knowledge and needs.” Cases studies and pictures drawn at significant times are included.

Kubler-Ross, Elizabeth. **Coping with Death and Dying**, (1973) FRC 155.937 Kub  
Five audiocassettes with topics including: The Fear of Dying; The Verbal and Non-verbal Symbolical Language; Stages of Dying--Denial, Pseudo-Denial, Anger, Bargaining, Depression, Acceptance or Resignation; Children and Death, Sudden Death

Lamm, Maurice. **The Jewish Way in Death and Mourning**, (Jonathon David, 2000) FRC 294.4

Outlines the customary behavior of Jews in the process of mourning—beginning at death and continuing to “the World Beyond the Grave.”

Levine, Stephen. **Healing Into Life and Death..** (Doubleday, 1987) FRC 155.937  
“Healing” in this work can be healing from a physical disease or from emotional distress. Included are suggestions to guide meditations as an aid to healing

Menton, Ted. **Gentle Closings: How to Say Goodbye to Someone You Love.**

(Philadelphia, PA: Running Press, 1991), FRC 155.937 Men

This is a collection of stories about letting go of loved ones written by a man who distributes teddy bears to sick children.

Osgood, Judith. **Meditations for Bereaved Parents**, Gial Publications, 1983) FRC 155.937 Osg

Thirty-five mothers and fathers share their anger and their anguish, and the insights that have enabled them to heal, to reinvest in living, and to smile and love again.

Prend, Ashley Davis **Transcending Loss: Understanding the Lifelong Impact of Grief and How to Make it Meaningful**, (Berkley Books, 1997) FRC 155.937

A book about death and grief, but also about hope and life.

Sankar, Andrea. **Dying at Home: A Family Guide for Caregiving.** (Baltimore, MD: Johns Hopkins University Press, 1991) FRC 155.937 SAN

Dying at home has become more of an option as technology has advances, and as the services of the hospice movement have become more available.

Wagner, Shelly. **The Andrew Poems**, (Lubbock, TX: Texas U. Press: 1994) FRC 155.937 Wag

Shelly Wagner’s poems evoke the life and death of her five-year-old son.

Aliki. **The Two of Them** (New York, NY: Mulberry Books, 1979) FRC 155.937 ALI  
Describes the relationship of a grandfather and his granddaughter from her birth to his death.

Blackburn, Lynn Bennett. **Timothy Duck** (Omaha, NE: Centering Corporation, 1987) FRC 155.937 BLA

Timothy Duck's best friend got sick. Suddenly Timothy had all kinds of feelings he had never had before. He was scared, he was mad, and he was all mixed up and did not know what to do.

Brown, Margaret Wise. **The Dead Bird** (Reading, Mass.: Addison-Wesley, 1965) –FRC 155.937 BRO

The children find a bird that has just died, and is still warm. He gets colder as they are touching him, and his body grows stiff. They were very sorry the bird was dead, and would not fly again, but pleased that they could dig a grave and bury it and sing to it the way grown-up people did when someone died. So they took it into the woods and dug a hole, and wrapped the bird up in grapevine leaves and put it in the ground. Then they put flowers on top of it. And every day, until they forgot they went and sang to their little dead bird and put fresh flowers on his grave.

Buscaglia, Lea. **The Fall of Freddie the Leaf** (Thorofare, NJ: Slack Incorporated, 1982) FRC 155.937 BUS

How Freddie and his companion leaves change with the passing seasons, finally falling to the ground with the winter's snow, is an inspiring allegory, illustrating the delicate balance between life and death.

Caseley, Judith. **When Grandpa Came to Stay** (New York, NY: Greenwillow Books, 1986) FRC 155.937 CAS

When Grandpa comes to his house to stay, Benny enjoys his company and helps him to cope with Grandma's death.

Cave, Anne Good. **Balloons for Trevor** (Concordia, MA: 1998)– FRC 155.937 CAV

The little boy's best friend, Trevor dies. His parents tell him that his body just quit. He has a great deal of very mixed emotions, as he tries to come to terms with the death.

Clardy, Andrea Fleck. **Dusty Was My Friend: Coming to terms with Loss.** (New York, NY: Human Sciences Press, 1984) FRC 155.937 CLA

Eight-year-old Benjamin remembers his friend Dusty, who was killed in a car accident, and tries to understand his own feelings about losing a friend in this way

Cohn, Janice . **I had a Friend Named Peter** (New York, NY: William Morrow, 1987) FRC 155.937 JOH

When Betsy learns about the death of a friend, her parents answer questions about dying, funerals and the burial process.

de Paola, Tomie. **Nana Upstairs and Nana Downstairs** (New York, NY: G.P. Putnam, 1978) FRC 155.937 DEP

A small boy enjoys his relationship with grandmother and great-grandmother, but he learns to face their inevitable death.

Egger, Bettina. **Marianne's Grandmother** (New York: E.P. Dutton, 1986) FRC 155.937 EGG

Marianne remembers her grandmother, her funeral, and what she enjoyed doing with her when she was alive, and how it was when she was ill.

Johnson, Joy and Mary. **Tell Me, Papa.** (Omaha, NE: Centering Corporation, 1978) FRC 155.937 JOH.

Written for young children, this book describes a funeral that includes a viewing, going to the church, and putting the body in the grave.

Jordan, Mary Kate. **Losing Uncle Tim** (Niles, IL: Albert Whitman, 1989) FRC 155.937 JOR

When his beloved Uncle Tim dies of AIDS, Daniel struggles to find reassurance and understanding and finds that his favorite grown-up has left him a legacy of joy and courage.

Jukes, Mavis. **Blackberries in the Dark** (New York, NY: Dell, 1985) – FRC 155.937 JUK

Nine-year-old Austin visits his grandmother the summer after his grandfather dies. Together they try to come to terms with their loss.

Kantrowitz, Mildred. **When Violet Died** (New York, NY: Parent's Magazine Press, 1973) FRC 155.937 KAN

Saddened by her pet's death, Eva suddenly thinks of a way to make life go on forever.

Maple, Marilyn. **On the Wings of a Butterfly** (Seattle, Wash. Parenting Press, 1992) FRC 155.937 Map

The story of Lisa, a child dying of cancer, who finds comfort and support in her friendship with a caterpillar preparing for transformation into a Monarch butterfly.

Mills, Joyce C. **Gentle Willow: a story for children about dying.** (Magination Press, 1993) FRC 155.937 MIL

Amanda is upset that she is going to lose her friend Gentle Willow, but the Tree Wizards help her understand that her memories are gifts from her friend and that there are special ways of saying goodbye.

Mundy, Michaelene. **Sad Isn't Bad.** (St. Meinrad, IN, One Caring Place, 1998) FRC 155.937 MUN

A grief guidebook for kids dealing with loss.

Palmer, Pat **"I Wish I Could Hold Your Hand..." A Child's Guide to Grief and Loss.** (CA: Impact Pub. 1994) FRC 155.937 PAL

Helps children identify feelings- from denial and anger to guilt and sadness- and to learn to accept and deal with them.

Ages 9-12

Rylant, Cynthia. **Missing May** (New York, NY: Orchard Books) FRC 155.937 RYL

After the death of her beloved aunt who has raised her, twelve-year-old Summer and her uncle Ob leave their West Virginia trailer in search of the strength to go on living.

Smith, Doris Buchanan. **A Taste of Blackberries** (New York, NY: Thomas Crowell, 1973) FRC 155.937 SMI

A first hand account of an eleven-year-old boy who recounts his efforts to adjust to the accidental death of his best friend through a harmless prank.

Ages 8 – 11

Schwiebert, Pat and Chuck DeKlyen. **Tear Soup** (Portland, OR: Grief Watch, 2003 ) FRC 155.937 SCH

Grandy, a wise woman makes tear soup in order to help her with her grief. Some of her neighbors give her what she needs, and others are not able to do so.

Taha, Karen. **A Gift for Tia Rosa** (New York, NY: Macmillan, 1986) FRC 155.937 TAH

Carmela loves Tia Rosa. When she comes back from the hospital she teaches her to knit. When she dies, Carmela is very upset. Her mother helps her to keep the memory of the lady alive.

Thomas, Pat **I Miss You** (Barron's, 2001) FRC 155.937 THO

An exploration of the concept...all things die, all things are born, but life goes on. Also has suggestions as to how to use it as a workbook.

Tresselt, Alvin. **The Dead Tree** (New York, NY: Parent's Magazine Press, 1972) FRC 155.937 TRE

The story of a tree that flourishes until it becomes very old and then starts deteriorating.

Zindel, Paul. **A Begonia for Miss Applebaum** (New York, NY: Bantam Books, 1970) – FRC 155.937 ZIN

After learning that their favorite teacher hasn't very long to live, Henry and Zelda become Miss Applebaum's Saturday companions. They visit Central Park, museums, etc. however Miss Applebaum can't escape the inevitable. Will Henry and Zelda be able to carry out her last wish?

Helen's death at eighteen from cancer, shatters the lives of her parents and siblings, especially her younger sister, Jessie, who tries to cope with her feelings of pain and confusion by reading pages from Helen's diary.

Greene, Constance C. **Beat The Turtle Drum** (New York, NY: Dell, 1978) –FRC 155.937 GRE

The 2 sisters Joss and Kate both enjoy riding horses. All was fine, until an unforeseen accident occurs which changes their lives forever.

Vigna, Judith. **Saying Goodbye to Daddy** (Morton Grove, ILL: Albert Whitman, 1991) FRC 155.937 VIG

Frightened, lonely, and angry after her father is killed in a car accident, Clare is helped through the grieving process by her mother and grandfather

Gryte, Marilyn. **No New Baby** (Omaha, NE: Centering Corporation, 1988) FRC 155.937 GRY

This is for those children whose expectant sibling dies.

Lowry, Lois. **A Summer to Die** (Boston, MA: Houghton Mifflin, 1977) FRC 155.937 LOW

Thirteen-year-old Meg envies her sister's beauty and popularity. Her feelings don't make it any easier for her to cope with Molly's strange illness and eventual death.

After her sister's suicide, Bethany searches for the reason Diane chose to die.

Temes, Roberta. **The Empty Place: a child's guide through grief.** (New Jersey, NY: Small Horizons, 1992) FRC 155.937 TEM

A third grader must cope with the death of his older sister. Feeling responsible for her death, the boy is finally able to open his heart to Betsy, his babysitter, who has lost a brother in a car accident.

Yeomans, Ellen. **Lost and Found: remembering a sister** (Centering Corporation, 2000) FRC 155.937 YEO

A preschool girl recounts her confusing thoughts and feelings after the death of her sister and the number of ways she continues to feel her sister's love.

her “sad eyes.” He is the only person who seems to understand the rage and fear Davey feels.

During a hospital stay after a serious traffic accident, nine-year old Rosemyn worries about her own injuries and the condition of her father and young sister and comes to terms with her mother’s death.

Letters and words from Alicia, the 4-year-old sister who loses her brother when he is a year old due to brain cancer.

A group of thirty-four children share their experiences with terminally ill brothers and sisters.

A concise and practical handbook showing how to help teen students affected by death, including a complete outline for a ten-week school-based grief support group.

Bluebond-Langner, Myra. **The Private Worlds of Dying Children.** (Princeton, NJ: Princeton University Press, 1978) FRC 155.3937 BLU

Observations of leukemic children, aged three to nine, in a hospital ward. Shows how they came to know that they were dying, how and why they attempted to conceal this knowledge from their parents and the medical staff, and how these adults in turn tried to conceal from the children their awareness of the child's impending death.

**Children Mourning, Mourning Children** (Bristol, PA: Taylor and Francis, 1996)  
FRC 155.9 CHI

Guide to helping children cope with loss. Chapters cover children's possible reactions to death, life-threatening illness, traumatic loss, and the relationship between dying children and well siblings. Includes a chapter on the role of schools and a bibliography for young readers.

Fitzgerald, Helen. **The Grieving Child: A Parent's Guide** (New York: Simon & Shuster, 1992) FRC 155.937 FIT

Offers advice for helping a child cope with the death of a parent of a loved one. Covers visiting the seriously ill or dying, using language appropriate to the child's age level, handling difficult situations, including murder and suicide, and deciding whether or not a child should attend a funeral.

Greenlee, Sharon **When Someone Dies.** (Atlanta, GE: Peachtree Publishing, 1992)  
FRC 155.937 GRE

Describes all the feeling states that someone experiences after the death of an important person in one's life.

Grolman, Earl. **Talking About Death: A Dialogue Between Parent and Child.** (Boston, MA: Beacon Press, 1990) FRC 155.937 GRO

Provides advice on how to explain the death of a loved one to a child, describes common reactions of children, and provides advice about children attending funerals.

Comprehensive resource section lists hundreds of associations, support groups, books for parent and child, films, journals, and newsletters.

Jewett, Claudia. **Helping Children Cope With Separation and Loss** (Harvard, Mass: The Harvard Common Press, 1982) FRC 155.4 Jew

Practical advice and specific techniques for parents who want to help a child recover from the stages of denial and mourning that can follow the loss of a loved one.

LaTour, Kathy. **For Those Who Live: Helping Children Cope With the Death of a Brother or a Sister.** (Dallas, TX: Kathy LaTour, 1983) FRC 155.937 LAT

This book includes many suggestions on how to help children—preschool to teenage—cope with grief after the loss of a sibling. A section on problems such as drug abuse and school-related problems that may appear after the death is included.

Mellonie, Bryan and Robert Ingpen. **Lifetimes: The Beautiful Way to Explain Death to Children** (New York: Bantam, 1983) FRC 155.937MEL

Simple, poetic text describes the life cycle.

Schaefer, Dan and Christine Lyons. **How Do We Tell the Children? A Step-by-Step Guide for Helping Children Two to Teen Cope When Someone Dies** (New York: New Market Press, 1993) FRC 155.937 SCH

Now updated with new material on AIDS, the loss of a companion animal, and talking with the mentally handicapped, this work provides practical advice for talking to children of all ages about death, separation, and loss.

Book describes possible steps to take when dealing with grief, eighteen positive ways to help a bereaved family, recommended reading for parents, grandparents and professionals, helpful suggestions for support-group leaders, and a self-study guide for surviving family members.

Doka, Kenneth. **Living with Grief After Sudden Loss: Suicide, Homicide, Accident, Heart Attack, Stroke.** (Bristol, PA: Taylor and Francis, 1996) FRC 155.937 DOK  
Interview with people who have experienced sudden loss. How they coped with grief and the special problems that death without forewarning can create.

Donnelley, Katherine Fair. **Recovering From the Loss of a Child.** (New York, NY: Macmillan, 1982) FRC 155.937 Fin

Bereaved parents and siblings share how they dealt with anger, guilt and grief after the death of a loved one. Includes information on organizations that help bereaved families and suggested readings.

Finkbeiner, Anna. **After the Death of a Child: Living With Loss Through the Years.** (New York: The Free Press, 1996) FRC 155.937 FIN

Interviews with parents who have lost a child. Finkbeiner, whose only child died in 1987, refers to her own experience and the experience of others to show that while bereaved parents can never really let go, they can and do recover, often developing a new appreciation for their own lives.
